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## **2019 Phi Rho Sigma Medalists**



The Irving S. Cutter Medal recipient is Leo J. McCarthy, M.D., lota chapter. It is presented for outstanding contributions to Medicine. Dr. McCarthy is a graduate of the University of Nebraska College of Medicine. After serving in the U.S. Navy as a battalion surgeon with the Marines in Vietnam he was Pathology resident at Stanford

University. He retired as Emeritus Professor of Pathology, Medicine and Pediatrics from Indiana University School of Medicine where, for over 30 years, he was Director of Transfusion Medicine and taught medical students. Dr. McCarthy was among the first to receive board certification in the new Transfusion Medicine specialty. His career in academic medicine was noteworthy because it occurred during remarkable times of medical advancements. He saw the advent of apheresis, the discovery of Hepatitis C, and was on the "front lines" during the devastating and confusing global AIDS epidemic. TTP was his area of special interest and was the first to treat cerebral malaria with red cell exchanges. During the early days of organ transplantation (kidney, bone marrow, liver, stem cell) Dr. McCarthy directed Indiana's first Cryobiology lab to support renal transplantation and supplied the necessary blood components for other transplant programs. He established the first Transfusion Medicine fellowship in Indiana and was a board member of the International Society of Blood Transfusion, serving as chairman in 2009. He is the recipient of numerous honors. In 2014 he was named Distinguished Alumnus of the Year, University of Nebraska College of Medicine; in 2015 he was given the National Catholic Education Association's Distinguished Graduate Award; and in 2017 was honored with the Glenn W. Irwin, Jr. Distinguished Faculty Award, Indiana University. He is a Fellow of the Royal Colleges of Physicians of Edinburgh and Ireland, a member of AOA and Phi Beta Kappa. He has endowed named lectureships in Transfusion Medicine (Riley Children's Hospital) now in its 25<sup>th</sup> year and History of Medicine (Indiana University). He established the McCarthy Award for History of Medicine Research (Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh), underwrote the McCarthy History of Medicine speaker (Royal College of Physicians of Ireland), and established scholarships at Boys Town, Saint Margaret Mary Grade School, and

Creighton Preparatory School and has named rooms at the McGoogan Medical Library (Nebraska) and the Ruth Lilly Medical Library (Indiana). Dr. McCarthy authored over 340 publications, had over 200 invited addresses, and over 1300 secondary citations.



William A. Reed, M.D. of Pi chapter is the recipient of the Jessie Ansley Griffin Medal for his outstanding contributions to Phi Rho Sigma Medical Society. A resident of Kansas City,

MO he has served as Chair of the Cardio Vascular Department and as a Professor of Surgery at the University of Kansas Hospital in Kansas Hospital in Kansas City, KS. He was also a founding member of Mid-America Thoracic and Cardio Vascular Surgeons. Dr. Reed has received the Lifetime Service award from Ingrams magazine which celebrates the unsung heroes of medicine in the greater Kansas City metro area. In 2013 he was given the Catalyst Award by the University of Kansas Hospital. Dr. Reed has authored over one hundred publications either as first author or co-author. In 2017 Dr. Reed and his late wife, Mary, were named Philanthropists of the Year in Kansas City. Away from medicine he is a partner in Stonecrest Farm where he raises thoroughbreds. The recipient of the Paul L. McLain Research Award is Hannah Meissner of Eta Chaper. This award recognizes research done by a member during his/her medical education. A graduate of Notre Dame with a degree in Biology and a minor in Poverty Stud-

ies, she received the Braco Award for Excellence in Biology Research for her work on breast cancer in Dr. Zachary Schaefer's laboratory. Hannah is a second year medical student at Creighton University and has continued her breast cancer research with Dr. Yaping Tu. She also serves as president of Creighton's AMA chapter. Future plans include practicing emergency medicine in an urban center before pursuing a Master's Degree in Public Health and working on health policy.

Elected the 72nd President of the American Academy of Family Physicians is **Gary LeRoy, Alpha Upsilon,'88**. Dr. LeRoy is the Associate Dean of Student Affairs and Admissions at Wright State University Boonshoft School of Medicine . He is also active in Phi Rho Sigma serving as National Vice- President, counselor to Alpha Upsilon chapter and was awarded the Jesse Ansley Griffin Medal for his outstanding contributions to the society.



James L. Breen, Alpha,'52 has retired from Volunteers in Medicine. Prior to joining VIM he served as Chair of the Ob/Gyn Department for over 30 years at Saint Barnabas Hospital in Livingston, NJ.. As a gynecologic oncologist he spent his entire career, quietly, deliberately, and

effectively working to improve the obstetric and gynecologic care of women. He has trained thousands of doctors through his residency training program and through his highly acclaimed course in Advance Gynecologic Surgery. He has served as President of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology and has received many awards including the American Cancer Society Man of the Year award and the Distinguished Surgeon Award from the Society of Gynecologic Surgeons. Now 93 years young he live in Livingston, NJ with his wife of 67 years, Doris.

The 2019 Distinguished Alumnus Award given by the Feinberg School of Medicine at Northwestern University was presented to Richard Gillum, Alpha '70. He is a pioneer in the field of cardiovascular health disparities and a co-founder of the Association of Black Cardiologists. Now a professor at Howard Medical School, he became fascinated by cardiology and cardiac physiology while in medical school and studied about health disparities that affected blacks and other minorities regarding hypertension, stroke and heart disease. He was the first African-American internal medicine resident at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston. Dr. Gillum has also done research in cardiovascular epidemiology at the National Institute of Health and the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. In accepting his award he said, "I hope that Northwestern will continue its proud history of offering opportunities for minorities and that they will continue a strong commitment to the Chicago community." Elected to Alpha Omega Alpha while at medical school he continues to be active in the organization and publishes in their journal, THE PHAROS.

Keeping it all in the family is Marvin Tiesenga, Beta Gamma,'54. A pioneer in Bariatric Surgery he did the first Gall Bladder operation laparoscopically in the Chicago area. He was in practice for forty five years and served as Chief of Surgery for twenty years at West Suburban Hospital in Oak Park, IL. His son, Frederick Tiesenga, also a Phi Rho from the University of Illinois College of Medicine, took over his father's practice when his father retired. Frederick serves as President of the Bariatric Society and has an office in Elmwood Park, IL Marvin also has a daughter who is an ENT and a grandson who is currently in medical school at Liberty University.

**Mildred Willy, Pi,'96** became the Associate Dean of Student Affairs at Central Michigan College of Medicine in April of 2019 after serving in an interim role since July of 2018. She also was elected President of the Saginaw County Medical Society and on the state level is the Chair of the Liaison Committee with the Medical Licensure Board, Michigan State Medical Society.
